

WE DO CARE FOR THE PAST 25 YEARS ...

It all started with a natural instinct to help others. The freedom we attained with the fall of Communism made us feel a sense of responsibility for what happens in the less fortunate parts of the world. A group of friends convinced the Czech public that it can deliver food, medicine and clothing to places like Sarajevo, Chechnya, Afghanistan. A quarter of a century later, we are a dynamic, professional organization that meets every challenge that comes its way.

In addition to humanitarian emergencies, we also have long-term projects in a number of developing countries. In places where disagreeing with the government is dangerous, we support civil society, dissidents, political prisoners and their families. At home, we work in dozens of socially excluded areas with people marginalized by the rest of society. We have programs in most schools, cinemas, we are in the press and on social media. We try to convey the most truthful information about the difficult problems around the world.

Much has changed in the past 25 years, but our core principles remain the same. We want to do valuable work and focus on the people we help and those with whom we work.

People in Need has provided aid in crisis-affected areas and defended human rights since 1992.

In 25 years, we have become the biggest non-profit organizations in Central Europe. Every year, we implement projects worth millions of Euros, helping hundreds of thousands of people, who were born in less-fortunate places on this earth.

Since our founding, we have provided direct help to 18 million people. We currently have permanent missions in 20 countries, with over 1,800 employees in total.

We helped people in Bosnia and Herzegovina during and after the war for five years, from 1993 to 1998. We brought food, medical and hygienic supplies, candles and matches to the besieged cities of Sarajevo, Tuzla, Goražde and Maglaj.

HELPING VICTIMS OF CATASTROPHES FOR 25 YEARS

We help people in dire situations – in war-torn countries or in regions affected by natural disasters, but also in places where people would not be able to climb out of poverty without outside help. Providing aid to innocent victims of foreign armed conflicts in the 1990's was the initial impetus for the founding of People in Need.

Humanitarian aid is a quick intervention to save people's lives, alleviate suffering and help victims of catastrophes get back on their feet. If an earthquake, typhoon or floods strike somewhere in the world, we try react with a fast and effective response. With the help of our donors and partners, we are able to deliver needed supplies and coordinate humanitarian aid within the first week of the disaster happening.


Helping people to get back on their feet

In areas affected by armed conflicts, such as Syria or Ukraine, we distribute not only food and food vouchers, but also try to help in lasting ways. We support the local markets and farming production, we involve local residents in public works and cooperate with local authorities to secure access to drinking water and garbage collection. We also help keep schools open and help children deal with psychological trauma.

For 25 years we have been helping, for example, during armed conflicts in Syria, Ukraine or in former Yugoslavia. We helped with the aftermath of earthquakes in Nepal or Pakistan, of typhoons in the Philippines and Sri Lanka, or of floods as home in the Czech Republic.

IMPROVING THE LIVES OF THE DESTITUTE

Development cooperation tries to support people in their efforts to take themselves out of poverty. We often follow up on our humanitarian activities with development projects, so we can help prevent future crises or reduce their negative impact. We work on resolving long-term problems, such as lack of access to quality education and healthcare, poverty or deterioration of the environment. We look for solutions with local residents, partner organizations and state administration, so that things can work in the long-term without our presence.

In a number of countries we have focused on malnutrition, which negatively affects not only early development, but a person's whole life. Another priority is strengthening people's resilience, so they themselves can deal with disease, impact of armed conflicts and natural disasters. We are also working on a growing problem of inner-city poverty and supporting basic and vocational education.

Working with the local community is key

In development cooperation, it is invaluable to include local residents in our activities, in order for our work to bring about real change. That is why in the countries where we provide aid, we also try to improve the work of the public sector and support civil society actors, so they can better communicate with their representatives and defend their rights. We try to help the impoverished make use of new technologies and investments, whether it is a farmer in Cambodia, fruit-grower in Georgia or a shepherd in Mongolia..



In 2017, we completed our biggest development project in Afghanistan. The result of ten years of work is 156 schools and clinics, 1,547 water sources, 5.5 thousand public toilets, 43 thousand kilometres of irrigation canals, 130 small hydroelectric plants and over two thousand solar power stations, as well as 5,900 kilometres of motorways and 75 thousand kilometres of roads.

HELP PEOPLE BECOME MORE RESILIENT



WE SUPPORT THOSE WHO CARE ABOUT HUMAN RIGHTS

The Centre for Human Rights and Democracy supports civil society and helps people, who are unjustly detained or are otherwise persecuted for their defence of basic rights. We work in a total of 13 countries, both in countries with authoritarian regimes, where basic human rights are suppressed, and civil society is effectively paralyzed, as well as in countries going through transformation, where the Czech experience can be an inspiration for a newly developing civil society. We opened our first human rights programme in 1997 in Cuba after local dissidents asked for our support.

A part of our work is securing help for people who face repression, and systemic support of active individuals and organizations, who work on defending human rights or other public activities. For example, we often help independent journalists or lawyers by providing them with training, study trips, or small grants that support their projects. We advocate for human rights and freedoms and support for civil society in authoritarian countries at various international forums and in public in the Czech Republic and abroad. We also give out the annual human rights prize Homo Homini to people who have made a significant contribution to the promotion of human rights, democracy and non-violent solutions to political conflicts.





We help lawyers, independent journalists, bloggers, students and activists, who care about the future of their countries, and believe in basic human values, and who are persecuted for it in their countries.



MAKING A BETTER SCHOOL FOR EVERYONE

People in Need works in more than half of all schools in Czechia. We help make schools into places that develop the potential and individual abilities of every child, and which use modern methodology to help children find their way in the modern world. We want today's younger generation to remember school as a good place full of discovery and respect. And we hope that today's schools can teach children to be active, kind and self-confident citizens, who can change their society for the better.

PIN's programmes introduce students to important topics through documentary films, discussions with witnesses of historic events, and interactive activities. We teach, for example, about media literacy, human rights, global issues, modern Czechoslovak history, social topics, equal opportunities in education, stereotypes and prejudices, etc.

We help all children be successful in school

Many students in normal Czech primary schools don't receive sufficient support and, as a result, often end up leaving mainstream system of education. To prevent this, we train teachers to work with students with special needs, or to work with emotions, prejudice or otherness.

The teacher's personality is crucial for students. He or she helps create the environment where children experience their triumphs and failures, form their opinions and prepare for life as adults. Which is why we also help teachers develop themselves by offering seminars, personal consultations and training, attractive teaching materials and documentaries. .




Every year People in Need helps approximately six thousand people who find themselves in a problematic situation. In addition to direct client work, we also do analytical work, particularly in the fields of debt reduction and education.

WE HELP PEOPLE RESTART THEIR LIVES SUCCESSFULLY


People who we work with often face a whole range of serious problems, including insufficient education, extreme debt, long-term unemployment or living in a “bad” location. We help both **individuals** and **families**. Through our work we want to help them gain important life skills and experiences. Our goal is to have those who use our services be able to deal with future challenges on their own. We consider it essential for each person to take an active role in finding solutions to his or her problems.e.

Supporting children and youth

We spend a lot of our time working with children and youngsters. We believe that quality education is the driving force that can extract a person out of a life in socially excluded areas. We try to work with children before they enter school, and, whenever possible, stay with them throughout their education. For the youngest ones, we run **14 pre-school clubs**, to the older kids we offer **after-school tutoring and career counselling**. We also run **seven low-threshold clubs** open to all.



Once Petr finally found a job, a debt collector came around. Among other things, he had 12 unpaid fines for using public transport without a ticket. We were able to combine all of his various debts into one lump sum, which took out the legal and execution fees lowering his total debt from 100 to 20 thousand crowns. The fees surrounding the repayment often makes it impossible to repay the debt itself, which in the end is also bad for the creditor.



HELPING FOR 25 YEARS



1992

Journalist Jaromír Štětina creates a journalistic-humanitarian team Epicentrum (Epicentre) at the Lidové noviny newspaper, which starts an SOS Nagorno-Karabakh fundraising campaign. Aid is sent to the region's hospitals, volunteers bring back accounts of the war.

1994

The team from the Lidové noviny Foundation finds a new home at Czech Television, and the **People in Need Foundation at Czech Television** is founded.

The **Homo Homini** prize for individuals who have greatly contributed to the promotion of human rights and democratic principles is conferred, for the first time, to Sergei Kovalyov for galvanising public opinion against the war in Chechnya.

1996

After the seize fire in Bosnia and Herzegovina, People in Need focuses its work on reconstructing hospitals, schools and cultural centres in the towns of Maglaj, Sanski Most and Lušči Palanka.

1998

The **Belorussian Centre** is founded, which provides objective and unbiased information about Lukashenko's regime and monitors human rights violations. PIN begins to work in other post-Communist countries, where human rights are violated or where civil society is slowly developing – Transnistria, Azerbaijan, Russia, Central Asia and Ukraine.

PIN begins helping in Roma settlements in eastern Slovakia, which were hit by floods. By 2004, a permanent office is opened here.

2000

An informational project called **Infoservis** is created to inform the public about the situation in crisis-affected areas, human rights violations and current global problems. This project ended in 2005, but served as the basis for long-term communication with the public on a number of topics.

Second Chechen war. People in Need was the first humanitarian aid organisation that entered Chechnya interdependently with a large supply of food, still during intense fighting. It later become the biggest regional partner of the UN's World Food Programme and UNHCR.

2002

Permanent humanitarian mission in **Afghanistan** is opened and begins food deliveries, fixing and reopening schools and helping refugees return to their homes.

From the One World film festival, the **One World in Schools** programme is created. It provides schools with documentary films and methodological tools to teach about the most relevant topics of today's world and modern history.

After massive floods in the Czech Republic, the **SOS Floods** fundraising campaign raises 269 million crowns, which are used to help affected families and projects of public interest.

2004

People in Need becomes the first Czech organization to provide humanitarian aid financed by **EU funds** – signs the first two contracts with the European Commission's Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection department (ECHO) for aid projects in Chechnya and Afghanistan. At the same time, we raise funds to help victims of an earthquake in Iran.

The first year of the fundraising campaign **Let's build a school in Africa** to help build and equip primary schools in southern Ethiopia.

Varianty publishes the **Common World** publication, the first didactic material in the Czech Republic focusing on the introduction of global development topics into classwork. In the next year, it implements an international programme Global School, which supports primary and secondary school teachers in teaching current global topics.

2006

Socially oriented projects are combined to form the Social Integration Programmes, which focus on systemic solutions to social exclusion in Czechia.

Humanitarian operations are carried out in **Java, Lebanon** and aid is provided after the spring floods in the **Czech Republic**. A development mission is opened in **Angola**, focusing on improving the local education system.

2008

Despite the military junta's efforts in Burma to halt the work of humanitarian organizations, we were able to deliver aid to tens of thousands of people affected by cyclone Nargis, thanks to the **SOS Burma Campaign**.

The **One World Film Festival** celebrates its tenth anniversary and attendance, for the first time, surpasses one hundred thousand.

2010

BRight after the **earthquake in Haiti** in January, People in Need begins providing humanitarian aid there. Later focuses primarily on education.

In April, the first run of the **Student Elections** project is held, where young people vote in mock elections and become acquainted with basic democratic institutions. The project included 135 secondary schools and students turned in 20,233 valid ballots.

2012

PIN begins helping victims of the conflict in **Syria**, supports Syrian doctors and refugees in Jordan. Our workers later move directly to the war-torn country, where the biggest humanitarian mission to date is opened.

An audio-visual website **www.jsns.cz** is launched. It offers film-based online educational materials for teachers and students.

The **Migration Awareness Programme** becomes part of the Varianty programme. It works with the media to promote migration-related topics, and works on breaking stereotypes connected with foreigners.

2014

PIN is one of the few organizations still operating directly in war zones in Syria. Three of our workers die in Syria together with other civilians hit by rocket fire in a residential district in Aleppo.

After years of supporting civil society in Ukraine, PIN decides to open a **humanitarian mission** in the east of the country to help the needy on both sides of the conflict.

We are actively helping craft an amendment to the bill, which significantly lowers fees to attorneys involved in **loan extortion**.

2016

The British government entrusts PIN to lead a consortium of humanitarian organizations providing aid in Syria. The organization will be heading its **biggest humanitarian project**, worth 30 million GBP, for the next few years.

We open the first PIN **international office** in Costa Rica, focused primarily on human rights activities, helping people facing political persecution, or support for civil society activities. The Costa Rica office runs projects in Cuba, Venezuela, Ecuador and Nicaragua.

After ten years in **Afghanistan**, PIN finishes its biggest development project. The result is 156 schools and clinics, 1,547 water sources, 5,5 thousand public toilets, 43 thousand kilometres of irrigation canals, 130 small hydroelectric plants and over two thousand solar stations, as well as 5,900 kilometres of motorways and 75 thousand kilometres of roads.

We join our sister organization in Slovakia Človek v ohrození to form a single organization.

OUR DONORS

1993

SOS Sarajevo: The largest humanitarian operation from post-Communist countries, aiding residents of Bosnia and Herzegovina. The humanitarian convoys with food and hygiene supplies head to besieged areas, three deliveries of medical supplies were airlifted to Sarajevo hospitals.

1995

PIN opens a permanent mission in the Caucasus. As part of the Bosnia and Herzegovina Month, concerts and exhibits are held around the Czech Republic. The foundation helps coordinate President Václav Havel's visit to besieged Sarajevo.

1997

The foundation's workers help clear the damage left by **floods in Moravia**. They secure food, drinking water and hygiene supplies deliveries, coordinate volunteers, clean wells, dry houses, etc.

PIN begins helping the **democratic opposition in Cuba**. They delivery medical and technical supplies, as well as financial aid directly in Cuba.

1999

The **Community social work project**, the precursor of today's Social Integration Programmes, begins work focused on increasing social capacities of various excluded groups on the fringes of Czech society. PIN trains social workers from partner organizations and starts projects to help the poorest among the Roma population.

The first year of the **One World Film Festival**. The international human rights documentary film festival becomes the first festival of its kind in Central Europe.

PIN starts a complex project to rebuild houses in post-war **Kosovo**. Additionally, we open three temporary shelters for families – mostly mothers with children – who had no homes to return to.

Convoys of more than 60 trucks with humanitarian aid head to Montenegro, Kosovo, Macedonia and Albania to help Kosovo refugees.

2001

The **Varianty** project is founded with the goal to improve minority relations in Czech society. During the first phase, a manual of intercultural education was created for primary and secondary schools, and PIN ran a campaign against racism and intolerance called "Be Kind to Your Local Nazi". The second phase of the project focuses on integrating intercultural education into all levels of the education system.

PIN field workers were able to draw media attention to the overlooked topic of **loan sharking** in underprivileged (primarily Roma) communities. A number of loan sharks were jailed and tried on the basis of our workers' information.

2003

People in Need is invited to join a network of European humanitarian and developmental aid organizations, **Alliance2015**. The permanent mission in **Iraq** begins its work and the first exclusively development projects are launched – in **Namibia** to help people living with HIV/AIDS, in **Ethiopia** working on education and access to drinking water.

The **Club of Friends** of People in Need is founded to collect regular financial donations, which should allow for rapid response action to natural disasters and wars, and to provide long-term help to human rights defenders, activists and families of political prisoners.

2005

Public fundraising campaign **SOS Sri Lanka** brought in 130 million CZK to help tsunami victims. PIN builds homes and schools in the northeast of the country, where aid supply and return to normalcy is complicated by a long-running conflict between the Tamil tigers and government forces.

First regional offices are opened in the Czech Republic along with the pilot pre-school club in Bilina.

The first year of the **Stories of Injustice – A Month of films in schools**, which screens documentary films about post-war Czechoslovak history and crimes of the Communist regime in primary and secondary schools.

2007

In reaction to natural catastrophes, three **SOS fundraising campaigns** are started, which allows us to deliver humanitarian aid to victims of floods in India's state of Bihar, the cyclone Sidr in Bangladesh and wildfires in Greece.

The name of the organization changes to **People in Need (Člověk v tísni, o.p.s.)**

2009

After destructive floods, we are able to gather almost 70 million CZK in a short time to provide aid to victims.

Field workers visit over 1,300 afflicted families, expand the services they provide and focus on complex support for victims.

Launch of the charity e-shop **SkutecnyDarek.cz** (Real Gift), allowing people to buy goats, cows, sewing machines and blackboards for people in developing countries.

2011

Following the **floods in Pakistan**, PIN undertakes the biggest humanitarian relief action in its history. Together with its Alliance2015 partners, it helps 1.9 million people by securing access to clean water, restoring their livelihoods and dwellings. We also organized a campaign to help refugees escaping famine in **Somalia**.

2013

Following the June **floods in the Czech Republic**, we distribute aid worth more than 70 million CZK. Our workers visit more than 1,800 affected families, working on a renovation plan with most of them.

A part of the **anti-debt campaign** since 2009, PIN managed to change the behaviour of the biggest non-banking loan providers. Companies stopped hiring external attorneys to extort petty loans and using higher interest on default than the civil code sets out.

PIN sends the first teams to the islands in the **Philippines** affected by the typhoon, a new humanitarian mission is set up in the easternmost part of the country.

2015

On the evening of 2 June, gunmen storm into the People in Need office in the remote Zari district of Balkh province in northern Afghanistan and shoot ten of our workers. This is the **worst tragedy** in the organization's history.

Together with partners from Poland and Norway, we opened the **Prague Civil Society Centre**, which supports an open society, the rule of law and civil initiatives in the countries of eastern partnership, Russia and Central Asian countries.

A humanitarian mission in **Nepal** begins operation to help earthquake victims.

2017

Join forces with two other organizations to launch a large-scale action to help people fleeing the Iraqi city of Mosul.

Together with Czech journalists, we organize a Week of media education in 140 Czech schools, with the goal of improving students' critical thinking and media literacy.

We continue in our fight against trading in poverty in the Czech Republic. Debt collectors have 4.6 million cases of unpaid debts against a million people, and the number of people unable to repay their debts is increasing.

We are celebrating 25 years since our founding.
